Awesome Aspen as seen & told by Ben Novagrad (3-25 to 4-1)

Three skiers – **Pat Connelly, Ben Novograd**, and **Mark Storz** – attended the Chicago Metropolitan Ski Council (CMSC)'s trip to Aspen. There were a total of 471 skiers from 17 clubs. Two of us (Pat and Ben) arrived in Aspen on Saturday, the 25th after an uneventful 12-hour drive from Omaha.

On Sunday, we attended a tasty but crowded welcome breakfast set up by CMSC. The weather turned nasty, with heavy snow and strong winds so after breakfast, we skied the best area for such circumstances – But-termilk. That mountain's low elevation and easy terrain was most suitable for the near-whiteout conditions. During the morning, we explored all parts of Buttermilk, including the eastern Tiehack section. The weather cleared around noontime, so we took the shuttle to Aspen (Ajax) mountain for the afternoon and skied there the rest of the day. The high winds were still somewhat troublesome but the snow quality was excellent.

That evening, we returned to the Buttermilk base for a CMSC welcome party featuring cake, ice cream, wine and beer. The next day, Monday the 27th, we took the shuttle to Snowmass for the first of two CMSC ski races. Mark had to work that day and couldn't attend. The race consisted of two slalom-type courses. Each racer took one run on each course, and the total time of the two runs determined results. Pat was 14th out of the 49 racers in his class; Ben was 23rd out of 47. Pat won a NASTAR silver medal.

After racing in the morning, we had a tasty, free CMSC-sponsored cheeseburger lunch at Spider Sabich picnic area at the base of the race course, and then skied a variety of terrain at Snowmass the rest of the day. We took advantage of excellent weather, sunny with light winds, by riding the Cirque platter pull lift to the top of Snowmass and skiing down the Cirque Headwall. Monday night we attended a CMSC pub crawl through various bars in downtown Aspen. The most noteworthy establishments were the J and Library bars in the Jerome Hotel and the new "39" techno bar in the Sky hotel.

Mark arrived in Aspen early Tuesday morning. The weather continued to be mostly sunny and pleasant, so we took the shuttle to Aspen (Ajax) mountain to ski higher terrain. We attended a fun, CMSC after-ski party at Belly-up, a local nightclub near the Aspen bus station, and followed it with dinner and drinks in downtown Aspen.

On Wednesday, the weather turned snowy and windy again. We retuned to Snowmass, but could only ski the middle and lower parts of the mountain due to lift closures and difficult conditions higher up. We visited the rarely-used Two Creeks base area at the far east side of the mountain and also stopped by the Campground base area on the far west side. Wednesday night, we continued to sample the bars and restaurants in downtown Aspen. Pat had been to Aspen many times and knew which establishments provided good value for the money. Thanks Pat!

We took the shuttle to Aspen Highlands on Thursday morning, for the second CMSC races. The weather was snowy and foggy which delayed races. Eventually, all three of us raced; Pat was 15th out of about 50 racers in his class, Mark was 24th and Ben was 27th of out of 50 racers in their class. Pat won a second NASTAR silver medal and Mark and Ben each won bronze. The weather cleared enough so Mark could ski on the double-diamond terrain. Pat and Ben sampled single-diamond runs and one or two doubles. We were able to use the mountain's new "Deep Temerity" lift.

Friday we spent a third day at Snowmass. The weather turned sunny and mild again, and we were able to ski all of the area. Mark and Pat skied the "Possible Gully" double-diamond chute, on which Mark had done a yard sale fall on a previous trip. Pat and Ben took the Cirque platter pull to the top and skied Roberto's and Lower Ladder to the area's base at the end of the afternoon We finished off with live music at the Cirque slope side bar. That evening, we attended the CMSC awards banquet at the St. Regis Hotel ballroom in downtown Aspen. Since this year was CMSC's 25th anniversary, lots of people wore silver outfits. The banquet featured a creamy chicken

breast main course, free red and white wine, and an unusual combination of cheesecake, thin chocolate and raspberries and blackberries for dessert, following by dancing to the sounds of a local DJ.

The next morning Pat and Ben left early for the return trip to Omaha. Mark left a little later for the 4-hour drive back to Colorado Springs after buying new skis in Aspen.

Non-Sponsored Memorial Day weekend Ski trip - May 26-29, 2006

Nine out of the past ten years, **Ben Novograd** and **Mark Storz** have set up a trip to Arapahoe Basin, Colorado on Memorial Day weekend. This is not a club sponsored trip but it's worth a mention to all ski aficionados. Skiing on Memorial Day weekend has advantages:

- Snow conditions can be surprisingly good. The lower part of the mountain can get slushy but the upper portion often has powder.
- Crowds and lift lines are almost nonexistent.
- Most of the mountain is open due to its high altitude (10 to 12 thousand feet) and northern exposure.
- Lodging and lift tickets are relatively cheap. We're staying at the new Arapahoe Inn motel near Keystone, about 6 miles away. They have rooms with two double beds each. The motel has an outdoor hot tub. Cost will be about \$195 per person for 3 nights lodging and 3 days lift tickets (combined price).
- Frostbite is not a problem. The probability of hypothermia is also reduced.
- The attitude is relaxed and laid back. No glitz, glamour or pretentiousness. Just skiing and snowboarding.
- Local wildlife comes out of hibernation. Skiers and snowboarders may see mountain squirrels, marmot (mountain woodchuck), chipmunks, or even a fox. Last year, we saw a herd of 18 mountain goats near the top of the mountain.
- This year, the ski area is sponsoring a "beach party" with live music and the 5th annual brewpubs festival!!! Contact Ben if you're interested in some really great springtime skiing — 291-5704
